"On December 9, the United States Senate passed the "Every Student Succeeds Act" (ESSA) [S.1177] by a final vote count of 85 to 12, and the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) was reauthorized. With the President's signature, hopefully in the days to come, No Child Left Behind (NCLB) will be no more. ESSA, for which NAfME has been advocating for the better part of the past year, includes a critical stand-alone listing for music in the legislation's all-important new definition of a "Well-Rounded Education" (previously known as "Core Academic Subjects")." ## NAfME National Leadership Assembly Washington, DC – June 24-29, 2015

This past June I attended the NAfME Leadership Assembly held in Washington, D.C. The days were filled with meetings on the national and division levels. I reconnected with fellow state officers (Presidents, President-Elects, State Executives, editors and chairs) and the national officers (President Glenn Nierman and key staff, such as Michael A. Butera, Executive Director and Chief Executive Officer, Christopher Woodside, Assistant Executive Director, Center for Advocacy and Constituency Engagement, and Peter Doherty, Director, Constituencies and Organizational Development).

Our first day in Washington was spent on Capitol Hill (Hill Day 2015). We were given just ONE task: to advocate for the "Every Child Achieves Act of 2015". This bill includes music and arts as CORE ACADEMIC subjects. I met personally with the staffs of Representatives Tulsi Gabbard and Mark Takai, and Senator Mazie Hirono. I am pleased to report that Senator Hirono and Representative Takai personally expressed their support of this bill. [On December 9, the United States Senate passed the "Every Student Succeeds Act" (ESSA) [S. 1177] by a final vote count of 85 to 12 (http://www.nafme.org/wp-content/files/2015/11/Text-of-the-Every-Student-Succeeds-Act-S1177.pdf). With the President's signature, No Child Left Behind (NCLB) will be no more. ESSA, for which NAfME has been advocating for the better part of the past year, includes a critical stand-alone listing for music in the legislation's all-important new definition of a "Well-Rounded Education" (previously known as "Core Academic Subjects"). This definition connects to various provisions throughout the bill which have the potential to support music in a variety of ways. President Obama signed the bill into law on December 10.

One full day was spent discussing the administrative side of NAfME to include membership: NAfME has a NEW mobile app – with this app you can join/renew, manage your profile, shop and donate. Also, membership discussion included NAfME's "family" of associations: Tri-M to Collegiate to Active membership. We also discussed in-conference help, advocacy, and the Give-A-Note Foundation (support of M.Ed. programs, access to and benefits of music study and corporate sponsorship).

Another day was spent sharing and reviewing this past year's successes-challenges-goals with the Western Division (CA, NV, AZ, HI, UT). The meeting was led by David Fullmer (Western Division President), Ellen Kirkbride (immediate Past President), and Russ Sperling (President-Elect). Interestingly, even though Hawaii was the smallest state represented (membership), many of the fellow Western Division



states have the same general problems and had diverse solutions. The Western Division met for a more in-depth meeting in September in Salt Lake City, UT; HMEA President Chet-Yeng Loong and Conference Chair Julianne Hiu attended.

The best day was ADVOCACY-HILL DAY 2015. On June 25, the Assembly and Collegiate joined together to advocate for music education on Capitol Hill. All the states were represented and visited our

representatives and senators (or their staff) to remind them of the importance of music education in the lives of their constituents. This year, I brought my daughter and son with me for the visits to Capitol Hill. These visits opened my children's eyes about the how the law works and its' connection to music education and my career. Upon our return to Hawaii, my children and I watched the news and followed NAfME reports throughout the summer-fall-winter as the "Every Student Succeeds Act" (ESSA) bill moved through Congress, passed, and was signed into law by President Obama. My children cheered with me when the bill became law; it was good to know my children recognized the importance of this bill both to music education AND to music students and educators.



It was an honor representing Hawaii at the NAfME National Leadership Assembly 2015. I met and learned much from our fellow state board members and our national leaders. Once again, I was reminded that NAfME has so much to offer to music education and music educators in Hawaii. I joined NAfME over ten years ago because I was in search of a "community" of music educators (I was hungry for teaching ideas and lonely in my school for I had no one who could "relate" to my trials as a classroom music teacher). I have learned so much through Hawaii's annual in-service conferences (I definitely couldn't afford to travel away for these gems of information) and have made lasting friends with whom I can learn, share ideas, and vent when needed. Joining NAfME was the best thing I have done for my teaching career; it fuels my passion as an educator and musician. And I am deeply grateful.

# Orff Schulwerk Workshop



Clinician: MAGGIE HOFFEE teaches music and movement at Greenacres Elementary School in Scarsdale, NY. She has served as a clinician at American Orff-Schulwerk Association workshops, as a presenter at AOSA conferences, and as a movement instructor at several Orff certification courses. Ms. Hoffee coordinated the movement component of Silver Burdett's 2002 Making Music series. She holds a master's degree in music education from the University of St. Thomas and a Certificate of Advanced Studies from the Orff Institute in Salzburg, Austria.

## **Workshop Topics:**

#### AM: Ode to Trees: Our roots and our reach

"The trees are whispering to me, reminding me of my roots, and my reach... shhhh... can you hear them?" — Jeb Dickerson

The subject of trees provides limitless possibilities for the music classroom. Come explore several of these in a workshop that offers opportunities for playing with poetry, singing through choral pieces, expressing yourself through small movement vignettes and creating instrumental accompaniments.

### PM: Orff Unbarred: Yes, But is it Orff?

Those unfamiliar with the Orff Schulwerk approach may misinterpret the presence of barred instruments as defining the work. In this session three teaching scenarios will be presented, each featuring exploration and improvisation without the use of barred instruments. The presenter will then examine Orff's essence and roots through a historical lens demonstrating that not only can the approach exist in the absence of pitched percussion, but also it can thrive and flourish.


